Background & Plan Development

Statutory Authority

Section 3001(c)(3) of the Public Health Service Act, as added by the Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health (HITECH) Act, requires the National Coordinator for Health Information Technology (ONC) to update the Federal Health IT Strategic Plan in consultation with other appropriate federal agencies and in collaboration with private and public entities.






Aligning the Strategic Plan with Today's Technology Ecosystem



- The HITECH Act of 2009 created a statutory requirement to update the Strategic Plan
- The pandemic emphasized the need for a commonly held set of health IT strategies to further public health goals
- Federal agencies should ensure that the benefits of health IT are equitably reaching all of the US population
- 21st Century Cures Act provisions accelerated new technology adoption and requirements
 - Including the latest ONC proposed rule (HTI-1) that will provide transparency, advance equity, innovation, and interoperability, and support the access, exchange, and use of electronic health information
- Health information exchange and access have transformed provider and patient interaction with health information



FEDERAL HEALTH IT
