

Section 1: CMS EPCS Program Overview

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For those of you who are new to the CMS EPCS Program or need a refresher, our first section is a brief overview on the CMS EPCS Program.

Program Background

First, let's talk about the program's background, including a few relevant definitions and the program's purpose, regulations, and benefits.

Electronic Prescribing for Controlled Substances Definition

Electronic prescribing for controlled substances (EPCS) is the electronic transmission of an error-free and understandable prescription for controlled substances from the issuing prescriber's point of care to a pharmacy.

Electronic prescribing for controlled substances (EPCS) is defined as the electronic transmission of an error-free and understandable prescription for controlled substances from the issuing prescriber's point of care to a pharmacy.

EPCS Program Versus e-Prescribing Software Programs

CMS EPCS Program:

- Is a compliance program.
- Uses Part D claims data to calculate prescriber compliance with the program requirement.

e-Prescribing Software Programs:

- Are digital systems.
- Are used by prescribers to send prescriptions to pharmacies electronically.

For more information on the U.S. Drug Enforcement Agency's (DEA's) requirements for e-prescribing software programs, visit the [DEA's Electronic Prescriptions for Controlled Substances webpage](#).

It's important to note that the CMS EPCS Program is a compliance program, not an e-prescribing software program or platform. The EPCS Program uses Part D claims data to calculate prescriber compliance with the program requirement. E-prescribing software programs are digital systems that prescribers use to send prescriptions to pharmacies electronically.

Note that prescribers issuing electronic prescriptions for controlled substances must use an e-prescribing software program that meets all U.S. Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) e-prescribing requirements.

Program Background, Purpose, and Regulations

The Substance Use-Disorder Prevention that Promotes Opioid Recovery and Treatment for Patients and Communities (SUPPORT) Act of 2018 was enacted to address the opioid crisis. Section 2003 of the SUPPORT Act mandates the CMS EPCS Program.

Compliance Requirement:

Prescribers must electronically prescribe at least 70% of their qualifying Schedule II–V controlled substance prescriptions under Medicare Part D and Medicare Advantage prescription drug (MA-PD) plans, after exceptions, for the measurement year.

With an understanding of what EPCS is and what makes it different from e-prescribing software programs, we can talk about the CMS EPCS Program's background, purpose, and regulations.

The Substance Use-Disorder Prevention that Promotes Opioid Recovery and Treatment for Patients and Communities (SUPPORT) Act of 2018 was enacted to address the opioid crisis. Section 2003 of the SUPPORT Act mandates the CMS EPCS Program requirement.

Through rulemaking, CMS established the program's compliance requirement, which is that prescribers must electronically prescribe at least 70% of their qualifying Schedule II–V controlled substance prescriptions for patients covered under Medicare Part D and Medicare Advantage prescription drug (MA-PD) plans, after exceptions, for the measurement year.

Beneficiary and Prescriber Benefits

Beneficiaries

Enhances patient safety by:

- Allowing for patient identity checks
- Reducing prescription tampering
- Allowing for medication recommendations that lower the risk of errors and potentially harmful interactions
- Ensuring timely and accurate transmission of time-sensitive prescriptions
- Reducing patient trips to prescriber offices and pharmacies

Prescribers

Reduces prescriber burden by:

- Deterring and detecting prescription fraud and irregularities
- Improving workflow efficiency
- Avoiding data-entry errors and pharmacy calls to clarify paper prescriptions

After learning what the CMS EPCS Program is, why it exists, and its compliance requirement, some of you may still be wondering what the program does for you, as prescribers, and what it does for the Medicare beneficiaries you serve.

For beneficiaries, the benefit of the CMS EPCS Program is that it enhances patient safety by:

- Allowing for patient identity checks
- Reducing prescription tampering
- Allowing for medication recommendations that lower the risk of errors and potentially harmful interactions
- Ensuring timely and accurate transmission of time-sensitive prescriptions
- Reducing patient trips to prescriber offices and pharmacies

For prescribers, the benefit of the program is that it reduces prescriber burden by:

- Deterring and detecting prescription fraud and irregularities
- Improving workflow efficiency
- Avoiding data-entry errors and pharmacy calls to clarify paper prescriptions

Program Requirement

Now let's talk about the CMS EPCS Program requirement and the requirement exceptions, including the small prescriber exception, the declared disaster exception, and the CMS-approved waiver exception.

Who Must Meet the Requirement



All prescribers who issue Schedule II–V controlled substance prescriptions under Medicare Part D or MA-PD plans must meet the CMS EPCS Program requirement.

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All prescribers who issue Schedule II–V controlled substance prescriptions under Medicare Part D or MA-PD plans in the measurement year are federally mandated to meet the CMS EPCS Program requirement.

MY 2024 Program Compliance

To be considered compliant for measurement year 2024, prescribers must meet the compliance threshold, which means that they electronically prescribed at least 70% of their qualifying Schedule II–V controlled substances prescriptions for patients covered under Medicare Part D, after exceptions, in the measurement year.

Prescribers are exempt from the program requirement in the following situations.

- **Small prescriber exception:** CMS automatically grants this exception to prescribers who issue 100 or fewer qualifying Medicare Part D controlled substance prescriptions in the measurement year.
- **Declared disaster exception:** CMS automatically grants this exception to prescribers in the geographic area of an emergency or disaster as determined by CMS. CMS posts a list of the qualifying emergencies and disasters for each measurement year on its EPCS Program webpage.
- **CMS-approved waiver exception:** CMS grants this exception to each prescriber who submits a waiver application and then receives a CMS-approved waiver because they were unable to meet the CMS EPCS Program requirement due to circumstances beyond their control.

Prescriptions written for a beneficiary in a long-term care (LTC) facility will be included in determining compliance no earlier than January 1, 2028.

Section 1: CMS EPCS Program Overview

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To be considered compliant for measurement year 2024, prescribers must meet the compliance threshold, which means that they electronically prescribed at least 70% of their qualifying Schedule II–V controlled substance prescriptions for patients covered under Medicare Part D, after exceptions, in the measurement year.

However, there are exceptions to the CMS EPCS Program requirement. Per Section 2003 of the SUPPORT Act, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) Secretary has discretion on whether to grant exceptions to the CMS EPCS Program requirement. The secretary also has the authority, through rulemaking, to enforce and specify appropriate penalties for final non-compliance with the program requirement.

Prescribers are automatically exempt from the program requirement in the following situations:

- For the small prescriber exception, CMS automatically grants this exception to prescribers who issue 100 or fewer qualifying Medicare Part D controlled substance prescriptions in the measurement year.
- With the declared disaster exception, CMS automatically grants this exception to prescribers in the geographic area of an emergency or disaster as declared by a Federal, State, or local government entity. Starting in the 2024 measurement year, CMS identifies which emergencies and disasters qualify for this exception and posts a list of the qualifying emergencies and disasters for each measurement year on its EPCS Program webpage.
- For the CMS-approved waiver exception, CMS grants this exception to each prescriber who submits a waiver application and then receives a CMS-approved waiver because they were unable to meet the CMS EPCS Program requirement due to circumstances beyond their control.

Note that for prescriptions written for a beneficiary in a long-term care (LTC) facility will be included in determining compliance no earlier than January 1, 2028. I'll now pass the presentation off to Jerome, who will begin by talking about the program timeline.


Program Timeline

Hi, everyone. Again, my name is Jerome Bukstein, the EPCS compliance and support specialist. Let's go over the typical timeline for the CMS EPCS Program, including when each period takes place during the measurement cycle.

Measurement Cycle (1)

Takes place over 24 months and consists of:


- Measurement year
- Notification period
- Waiver application submission period



In general, the measurement cycle takes place over 24 months and consists of:

- The measurement year
- The notification period
- The waiver application submission period

Measurement Cycle (2)



Section 1: CMS EPCS Program Overview

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On screen is the CMS EPCS Program timeline, which represents 1 measurement cycle.

The timeline begins with the compliance start and end dates, which are January 1 and December 31, respectively, of the measurement year. The timeline then shows that the compliance analysis period begins August after the measurement year and then the notification period begins in mid-September.

The waiver application submission period, which just began, starts mid-September, lasting for 60 days, and ends mid-November. During this period, CMS will begin notifying prescribers about their waiver application status on a rolling basis as waiver applications come in, including whether their waiver application has been approved or denied and whether the reviewer requires additional information from the submitter.

To receive notifications about the waiver application submission period, be sure to sign up for the CMS EPCS Program Listserv. The timeline also shows that in mid-November after the measurement year, CMS will have notified all prescribers about their waiver application status, and all prescribers will have their final compliance status for the measurement year.

Measurement Year

The measurement year begins January 1 and ends December 31 each calendar year.

Prescriptions filled during this time were used to calculate compliance for the measurement year.

Ends December 31

The measurement year begins January 1 and ends December 31 each calendar year.

Prescriptions filled during this time will be used to calculate compliance for the year.

CMS begins its compliance calculation in August, when it has received most of the Medicare Part D claims.

Compliance Analysis, Notification, and Waiver Application Periods

Compliance analysis period

- Begins in August after the measurement year
- Is when CMS reviews Medicare Part D prescription claims



Notification period

- Takes place in September after the measurement year
- Is when CMS notifies prescribers of their initial compliance status



Waiver application submission period

- Occurs from mid-September to mid-November after the measurement year
- Is when prescribers and their designated representatives can log into the CMS EPCS Prescriber Portal to look up a prescriber's compliance status and submit a waiver application for CMS to determine each prescriber's final compliance status

The compliance analysis period begins in August after the measurement year. During this time, CMS reviews Medicare Part D prescription claims data to determine whether prescribers have met the compliance threshold for the CMS EPCS Program, after exceptions have been applied.

The compliance analysis period for the 2024 measurement year took place in August and September 2025 and just ended.

The notification period takes place in September after the measurement year and is when CMS notifies prescribers of their initial compliance status and any associated review or waiver application process that may be available before CMS determines prescribers' final compliance statuses.

The notification period for measurement year 2024 is taking place now, in September 2025.

The waiver application submission period occurs from mid-September to mid-November after the measurement year and is also happening now. This period is when prescribers and their designated representatives can log in to the CMS EPCS Prescriber Portal to look up a prescriber compliance status and submit a waiver application for circumstances beyond the prescribers' control. CMS then determines each prescriber's final compliance status.

The waiver application submission period for measurement year 2024 is taking place now, starting mid-September and ending mid-November 2025.

Program Non-Compliance

Next, we'll talk about what happens when a prescriber is found non-compliant with the CMS EPCS Program, including the program's non-compliance action and non-compliance notice.

Non-Compliance Action

The non-compliance action is the non-compliance notice from CMS.

Each non-compliant prescriber receives the non-compliance notice during the notification period. The non-compliance notice includes information to a prescriber that they are violating the program requirement, about how they can come into compliance, and on the benefits of e-prescribing for controlled substances.

The notice also includes a link to the CMS EPCS Prescriber Portal where each prescriber may:

- Look up their compliance status.
- Submit a waiver application.

Section 1: CMS EPCS Program Overview

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The CMS EPCS Program's non-compliance action is the non-compliance notice.

Each prescriber identified by CMS as non-compliant with the CMS EPCS Program requirement for the measurement year receives the non-compliance notice during the notification period.

For measurement year 2024, the non-compliance action is the notice of non-compliance. The notice includes information to a prescriber that they are violating the CMS EPCS Program requirement, information about how they can come into compliance, information on the benefits of EPCS, and a link to the CMS EPCS Prescriber Portal where they can look up their compliance status and have the opportunity to submit a waiver application for circumstances beyond their control.

Final Non-Compliance With the CMS EPCS Program

Final non-compliance under the EPCS Program may be considered in CMS processes for assessing potential fraud, waste, and abuse, which, in some instances, could result in a referral to law enforcement or revocation of billing privileges in the event that evidence of fraud, waste, or abuse is present.



A prescriber's final non-compliance under the EPCS Program may be considered in CMS processes for assessing potential fraud, waste, and abuse, which, in some instances, could result in a referral to law enforcement or revocation of billing privileges in the event that evidence of fraud, waste, or abuse is present.

Getting the Non-Compliance Notice

CMS:

- Emails the notices through CMSLists@subscriptions.cms.hhs.gov or EPCSProgramSupport@rainmakersolutions.com when possible.
- Sends the notices as a physical letter if there's no email address for the prescriber in the Medicare Provider Enrollment, Chain, and Ownership System (PECOS) or in the National Plan and Provider Enumeration System (NPPES).

Note that CMS emails the non-compliance notices through the CMS lists or CMS EPCS Program Support team's email addresses, as shown on screen, when possible and as a physical letter if there's no email address for the prescriber in the Medicare Provider Enrollment, Chain, and Ownership System (PECOS) or in the National Plan and Provider Enumeration System (NPPES).

Reminder: Update Your Addresses in PECO and NPPES

CMS encourages prescribers to update their email and mailing addresses in [PECOS](#) and [NPPES](#).*



* CMS also uses these addresses and PECOS and NPPES as the data sources for identifying which prescribers qualify for the automatic declared disaster exception.

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CMS encourages prescribers to update their email and mailing addresses in PECOS and NPPES.

By making sure their email and mailing addresses are up to date in these systems, prescribers ensure their timely receipt of the notices and, therefore, the opportunity to submit a waiver application to become compliant.

Note that CMS also uses these addresses and PECOS and NPPES as the data sources for identifying which prescribers qualify for the automatic declared disaster exception.

Section 2: CMS EPCS Prescriber Portal Uses

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In this section, we go over the CMS EPCS Prescriber Portal and its uses.

CMS EPCS Prescriber Portal Overview

First, we talk about what the CMS EPCS Prescriber Portal is, its background, and its different uses.

EPCS Prescriber Portal Background

The [CMS EPCS Prescriber Portal](#) is a web platform that a prescriber of Schedule II–V controlled substances under Medicare Part D and the prescriber’s designated representatives can access to:

- Look up the prescriber’s compliance status for the measurement year
- Submit a waiver application for the measurement year, if needed
- Monitor the prescriber’s waiver application status

The waiver application submission period is open on the EPCS Prescriber Portal for 60 days from mid-September to mid-November after the measurement year.

The CMS EPCS Prescriber Portal is a web platform that a prescriber of Schedule II–V controlled substances for patients covered under Medicare Part D and the prescriber’s designated representatives can access:


- To look up the prescriber’s compliance status for the measurement year, including whether they were granted any automatic exceptions.
- To submit a waiver application for the measurement year, if needed, explaining any circumstances beyond the prescriber’s control that prevented them from meeting the program requirement.
- To monitor the prescriber’s waiver application status.

Note that the waiver application submission period is open on the EPCS Prescriber Portal for 60 days from mid-September to mid-November after the measurement year.

Looking Up a Prescriber's Compliance Status

On the EPCS Prescriber Portal, each prescriber can look up their compliance status to:

- Look up whether they're compliant with the program for the measurement year
- Review their compliance details for the measurement year



On the EPCS Prescriber Portal, each prescriber can look up whether they're compliant with the program and review their compliance details for the measurement year by looking up their compliance status.

The compliance details a prescriber can look up include their total number of Part D prescriptions, their total number of e-prescribed prescriptions, their percentage of prescriptions that they e-prescribed, and whether they qualify for any automatic exceptions, such as the declared disaster exception and small prescriber exception.

Submitting a Waiver Application

Each fall after the measurement year, for 60 days typically from mid-September to mid-November, each prescriber and their designated representative may submit a waiver application, as needed, through the EPCS Prescriber Portal to receive a CMS-approved waiver exception when circumstances beyond their control prevented the prescriber from meeting the EPCS Program requirement.

For a CMS-approved waiver application, the prescriber receives a program waiver for the entire measurement year.

Users can also submit a waiver application for a prescriber on the CMS EPCS Prescriber Portal. Each fall after the measurement year, for 60 days typically from mid-September to mid-November, each prescriber and their designated representative may submit a waiver application, as needed, to receive a CMS-approved waiver exception when circumstances beyond their control prevented the prescriber from meeting the EPCS Program requirement.

Note that for a CMS-approved waiver application, the prescriber receives a program waiver for the entire measurement year.

New for MY 2024

Here's what's new in the CMS EPCS Prescriber Portal for measurement year 2024.

Looking Up Multiple Prescriber Compliance Statuses

The first new feature added to the EPCS Prescriber Portal for measurement year 2024 is the ability for users to look up more than 1 prescriber's compliance status at once by entering multiple National Provider Identifier (NPI) numbers into the provided field.

Submitting a Waiver Application for a Group of Prescribers

The other new feature added to the EPCS Prescriber Portal for measurement year 2024 is the bulk waiver application submission feature that enables a user to submit a single waiver application for a group of prescribers who are considered non-compliant with the CMS EPCS Program for the measurement year.

In the demonstration portion of this presentation, we'll provide step-by-step instructions on how to access and use these new features.

If a prescriber didn't meet the compliance threshold minimum, or electronically prescribe at least 70% of their qualifying Schedule II–V controlled substance prescriptions for patients covered under Medicare Part D and MA-PD plans, after exceptions, for the measurement year, they have the opportunity to submit a waiver application explaining the circumstances beyond their control that prevented them from meeting the EPCS Program requirement to become compliant with the program.





If a user doesn't have a HARP account, they can apply for one on the HARP Create an Account webpage at HARP.CMS.gov/register/profile-info.


Looking Up Prescriber Compliance Status for the Measurement Year

Now let's discuss how to look up a prescriber's compliance status for the measurement year.

Note that for the purposes of this demonstration, we use mock prescriber data to avoid unauthorized use of and disclosure of Protected Health Information (PHI).

Looking Up a Prescriber's Compliance Status

- Scroll to the Check National Provider Identifier (NPI) Compliance Status and Submit Waiver Application section.
- Enter the prescriber's NPI number in the NPI(s) field.
- Select the **Check Status** button.

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After you complete two-factor authentication, scroll to the Check NPI Compliance Status and Submit Waiver Application section.


In this section, you can look up a prescriber's 2024 compliance status using their National Provider Identifier (NPI) number.

Next to the **Check Status** button is the NPI(s) field where you can enter the prescriber's NPI number.

When you're finished entering the NPI number, select the **Check Status** button.

Looking Up Multiple Prescriber Compliance Statuses (1)

- Scroll to the Check NPI Compliance Status and Submit Waiver Application section.
- Enter or copy and paste multiple prescribers' NPI numbers, separating each with a comma, into the NPI(s) field.
- Select the **Check Status** button.



Tip: Use Microsoft Copilot to enter a long list of NPI numbers separated by commas.


Now that you know how to look up a single prescriber's compliance status, let's talk about how to look up the compliance status of multiple prescribers at once for measurement year 2024. First, as with looking up a single prescriber, scroll to the Check NPI Compliance Status and Submit Waiver Application section. Again, in this section, next to the Check Status button, is the NPI(s) field where you can enter or copy and paste multiple prescribers' NPI numbers, separating each with a comma.

Tip: If you need to enter a long list of NPI numbers, use Microsoft Copilot, a free online AI tool, to format your list properly and separate NPI number with a comma. More information on this tip is available in the CMS EPCS Prescriber Portal & Waiver Application User Guide.

When you're finished entering the NPI numbers, select the **Check Status** button.

Looking Up Multiple Prescriber Compliance Statuses (2)

- Read through and confirm all the displayed prescriber NPI numbers and names.




The compliance status of each prescriber will be sorted into different compliance status boxes indicating each prescriber's compliance status for the measurement year.

At this time, read through and confirm all the displayed prescriber NPI numbers and names.

Note that looking up the compliance status of 1 prescriber will also bring up a compliance status box but just for that single prescriber.

Looking Up Multiple Prescriber Compliance Statuses (3)

- Select the down arrow next to each prescriber's name to reveal the prescriber's compliance data for the measurement year.

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
Select the down arrow next to each prescriber's name to reveal the prescriber's compliance data for the measurement year.

So what do all these statuses mean?

Let's go over the different compliance statuses, which indicate whether the prescriber is compliant, has the opportunity to submit a waiver application, or doesn't need to act further.

Compliant Prescriber: Green “NPI meets the CMS EPCS Program requirement” Screen (1)

Indicates that the prescriber has met the program requirement for MY 2024.

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Once you enter the prescriber’s NPI number, the prescriber’s compliance status for the measurement year should appear. First, let’s talk about the different statuses a compliant prescriber may encounter.


Here’s an example of a prescriber who met the program requirement for the measurement year.

If you get a green box that says “NO FURTHER ACTION REQUIRED: NPI meets the CMS EPCS Program requirement,” this indicates that the prescriber has met the program requirement for the measurement year. To be considered compliant, the prescriber must have electronically prescribed at least 70% of the qualifying Medicare Part D Schedule II–V controlled substance prescriptions or received either an automatic small prescriber exception or declared disaster exception.

Compliant Prescriber: Green “NPI meets the CMS EPCS Program requirement” Screen (2)

Compliance information includes prescriber's:

- Total number of Part D prescriptions filled during the measurement year
- Total number of those prescriptions prescribed electronically
- Percentage of those prescriptions prescribed electronically
- Granted automatic exceptions

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
The prescriber's name and specialty can be found on the side of the screen. Also on the side are the total number of the prescriber's Part D prescriptions filled during the measurement year. In this example, 44 of these prescriptions were filled. Hovering over the question marks on the screen gives more information on how CMS determined these numbers.

Next, you'll notice that this prescriber sent 43 of those prescriptions electronically, resulting in 97% of their prescriptions being electronically prescribed. This percentage is above the 70% program requirement. However, let's look at the box to determine whether CMS granted this prescriber any automatic exceptions. So this prescriber met 2 exceptions: the declared disaster exception and the small prescriber exception.

Receiving the declared disaster exception means that this prescriber was located in the geographic area of an emergency or disaster during the measurement year as determined by CMS. Receiving the small prescriber exception means that the prescriber's total number of Part D prescriptions for the measurement year was 100 or fewer.

Compliant Prescriber: Blue “NPI is not part of the CMS EPCS Program for the measurement year” Screen

Means that the prescriber wasn't part of the CMS EPCS Program measurement year, so the prescriber is considered compliant and no further action is needed



When you get a blue box that says “NO FURTHER ACTION REQUIRED: NPI ... is not part of the CMS EPCS Program for the measurement year (no further actions required),” it means that the prescriber wasn't part of the CMS EPCS Program for the measurement year, so the prescriber is considered compliant and no further action is needed.

Now let's look at what statuses a non-compliant prescriber may encounter.

Non-Compliant Prescriber: Prescriber Has the Opportunity to Submit a Waiver Application to Become Compliant


Means that the prescriber has the opportunity to submit a waiver application because they didn't meet the program requirement and are considered non-compliant for MY 2024



If the prescriber you enter an NPI number for receives the red “CONSIDER SUBMITTING A WAIVER: NPI ... does not meet the CMS EPCS Program compliance” compliance status, this means that the prescriber has the opportunity to submit a waiver application because they didn't meet the program requirement, including that they didn't receive any automatic exceptions, and are considered non-compliant for the measurement year.

Non-Compliant Prescriber: Prescriber Already Submitted Waiver Application

Means that the prescriber is non-compliant with the program but a waiver application has already been submitted for the prescriber and is under review by CMS

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Another compliance status a non-compliant prescriber may encounter is a blue box that says, “No further action required for the checked NPI. Check a different NPI number to proceed. CHECK THE WAIVER STATUS TABLE NPI ... has a waiver application.” This means that a waiver application has already been submitted for the prescriber and is under review by CMS.

At this point, you aren’t required to do anything additional for the waiver application. However, as the waiver application goes through the review process, you may be required to act further, including providing additional information should the reviewer ask for it.


Submitting, Monitoring, and Withdrawing a Waiver Application

Next up, we'll show you how to submit, monitor, and even withdraw a waiver application for the measurement year.

We'll start by going over how to submit a waiver application for both a single prescriber and a group of prescribers who aren't yet compliant with the program for the measurement year.

Submitting a Waiver Application for a Single Prescriber (1)


- Select the **Apply for Waiver** button.
- Review the prescriber's details for accuracy.



First, select the **Apply for Waiver** button. Note that this button appears only for a prescriber with a red box status. If the prescriber doesn't have a red box status, you won't be able to submit a waiver application for them. Next, review the prescriber's details for accuracy.

Submitting a Waiver Application for a Single Prescriber (2)

- Fill in the appropriate information for the prescriber in the Submitter Details section.
- Enter any additional email addresses you'd like to send a copy of the waiver application.
- Enter the prescriber's phone number.
- Select the option that best describes your relationship to the prescriber from the drop-down list.
- If you selected "Other," describe your relationship in the Your Role field.

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
In the Submitter Details section, fill in the appropriate information for the prescriber. The prescriber's full name and main email address should already be in their designated fields. 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In the Waiver Details section, fill in the appropriate information for the prescriber. By checking the first box, you're saying you're submitting a waiver application because the prescriber experienced e-prescribing software limitations outside of their control.


When you check the second box, you're saying you're submitting a waiver application because the prescriber experienced other technological limitations outside of their control, such as that broadband internet providers didn't offer services in the area the prescriber practiced.

If you check the third box, you're saying you're submitting a waiver application because the prescriber experienced a local disaster or emergency that affected the prescriber's ability to e-prescribe.

By checking the fourth box, you're saying you're submitting a waiver application because of other circumstances outside of the prescriber's control.

Submitting a Waiver Application for a Single Prescriber (4)

- Explain in detail the circumstances beyond the prescriber's control that prevented them from meeting the EPCS Program requirement in the text box.




Next, in the text box, explain in detail the circumstances beyond the prescriber's control that prevented them from meeting the EPCS Program requirement.

The explanation should be at least 30 and no more than 5000 characters.

Submitting a Waiver Application for a Single Prescriber (5)

- Select the **Select Files** button and then choose the desired files from your computer to upload supporting documents.

Note: Uploading supporting documents is optional but highly encouraged.




After uploading any files, you'll need to agree to the attestation. To review it, select the box next to the attestation statement.

- Select the **Save & Close** button to save your progress, exit the waiver application, and come back later.

Note: Selecting this button means that you haven't submitted the waiver application.




Now that you know how to submit a waiver application for 1 prescriber, let's talk about how to submit a single waiver application for a group of prescribers who are considered non-compliant with the CMS EPCS Program for the measurement year. We'll do this through the bulk waiver application submission feature.

First, follow the instructions for looking up the compliance statuses of multiple prescribers.

Submitting a Waiver Application for a Group of Prescribers (2)

- Check the box next to each listed prescriber's NPI number that you would like to include in the group waiver application.
- Select the **Apply for Waiver(s)** button.




If after looking up the compliance status of multiple prescribers you get a red box saying “CONSIDER SUBMITTING A WAIVER,” check the box next to each listed prescriber’s NPI number that you would like to include in the group waiver application.

Next, select the **Apply for Waiver(s)** button.

Submitting a Waiver Application for a Group of Prescribers (3)

- Confirm the accuracy of the NPI number, prescriber name, and prescriber type under Prescriber Details for each prescriber included in the submitted group waiver application.



Under Prescriber Details, confirm the accuracy of the NPI number, prescriber name, and prescriber type for each prescriber included in the submitted group waiver application.

Submitting a Waiver Application for a Group of Prescribers (4)

- Fill out the rest of the waiver application as instructed in the steps for submitting a waiver application for a single prescriber.
- Submit the waiver application.

Note: For a group waiver application, you must submit the waiver application before logging out. Otherwise, you'll have to start the waiver application over.



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Note that each prescriber included in the group waiver application must have the same reason or reasons for submitting a waiver application. You can't select a different reason or different reasons for each prescriber.

The rest of the steps for submitting a group waiver application is the same as the remaining steps for submitting a waiver application for a single prescriber.

Note that for a group waiver application, you must submit the waiver application before logging out of the EPCS Prescriber Portal. If you don't submit the waiver application before logging out, you'll have to start the waiver application over.

Monitoring the Status of a Waiver Application

Now let's talk about monitoring the status of a submitted waiver application.

Viewing a Waiver Application Status (1)


The waiver application will now go through the waiver application review process.

You'll receive an email saying whether the waiver application has been approved or denied if a final decision has been made.

If approved, the prescriber will be granted a CMS-approved waiver exception for the entire measurement year.

If denied, the prescriber isn't eligible for a CMS-approved waiver exception and is considered non-compliant with the program for the measurement year.

You'll also be able to look up the submitted waiver application and monitor its status in the EPCS Prescriber Portal.


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After a waiver application is submitted, it goes through the waiver application review process. During this process, the reviewer will determine whether the waiver application is approved or denied. If a final decision on the waiver application is made, you'll receive an email with the status of the waiver application.

If a waiver application is approved, the prescriber will be granted a CMS-approved waiver exception for the entire measurement year because they were unable to meet the program requirement due to circumstances beyond their control. If a waiver application is denied, the prescriber isn't eligible for a CMS-approved waiver exception and is considered non-compliant with the program for the measurement year. In addition to receiving an email with the status of the waiver application, you'll also be able to look up the submitted waiver application and monitor its status in the EPCS Prescriber Portal.

Viewing a Waiver Application Status (2)

- The CMS EPCS Waiver Applications section allows you to view all your submitted waiver applications and filter them by different statuses, including approved, deleted, denied, draft, submitted, and withdrawn.
- To download a waiver application, first select **View** from the Actions column.


The CMS EPCS Waiver Applications section allows you to view all your submitted waiver applications and filter them by different statuses, including approved, deleted, denied, draft, submitted, and withdrawn.

For each waiver application in the table, you have 2 options to choose from in the Actions column: View and Withdraw.

To download a waiver application, select **View** from the Actions column to open a window including information associated with the waiver application.

Viewing a Waiver Application Status (3)


- Then select the waiver ID number and **Download Application to PDF**.



From this window, you can download a PDF version of the waiver application by selecting **Download Application to PDF**.

Withdrawing a Waiver Application (1)

Select the **Withdraw** button to withdraw a submitted waiver application.




If you'd like to withdraw a submitted waiver application, you can do that from this window, as well, by selecting the **Withdraw** button.

Withdrawing a Waiver Application (2)

- Select **Withdraw** from the Actions Column as another way to withdraw a submitted waiver application.

Another way to withdraw a submitted waiver application is to select **Withdraw** from the Actions column. A new window will then pop up, and you'll need to select the Yes, Withdraw Waiver button to withdraw the waiver application.


After you've withdrawn the waiver application, you'll receive a confirmation email from EPCS-EPrescribe@CMS.HHS.gov. As a best practice, we encourage you to maintain your own documentation of the waiver application and decision status.

Receiving and Responding to Additional Information Requests (1)

A reviewer may require additional information before they can make a final decision on whether to approve or deny the waiver application.

If the reviewer requires additional information, they'll request it through the comment feature in the CMS EPCS Prescriber Portal.

If you receive a comment through the EPCS Prescriber Portal, you'll receive an email notification from EPCS-EPrescribe@CMS.HHS.gov.



Let's discuss receiving and responding to requests for additional information from a waiver application reviewer.


Sometimes, a reviewer may require additional information before they can make a final decision on whether to approve or deny the waiver application. This additional information could include more details on the circumstances beyond the prescriber's control that prevented them from meeting the program requirement for the measurement year. You may also be asked to provide additional supporting documents, so it's important to keep all supporting documents until after the waiver application has been approved.

If the reviewer requires additional information, they'll request it through the comment feature in the CMS EPCS Prescriber Portal. If you receive a comment through the EPCS Prescriber Portal, you'll receive an email notification from EPCS-EPrescribe@CMS.HHS.gov.

The email will prompt you to log into the EPCS Prescriber Portal to view and respond to the comment. The email also includes the number for the waiver application the reviewer requested additional information for, instructions on how to find comments in the EPCS Prescriber Portal, and the date by which you'll need to respond to the reviewer's comment and provide the requested additional information or follow the reviewer's other instructions.

Receiving and Responding to Additional Information Requests (2)

- Log into the EPCS Prescriber Portal.
- Navigate to the CMS EPCS Waiver Applications section.
- Locate the waiver application you received a comment for.
- Select the down arrow next to the waiver application status.
- Then select **View Comments** from the drop-down list.


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Once you log into the EPCS Prescriber Portal, you'll want to navigate to the CMS EPCS Waiver Applications section and locate the waiver application you received a comment for.

Select the down arrow next to the waiver application status and then select "View Comments" from the drop-down list.

Receiving and Responding to Additional Information Requests (3)

- Review the comment.
- Select the **Add Comment** button and respond accordingly.





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This will open the waiver application's Comments window. Review the comment, and then select the Add Comment button and respond accordingly. You may be asked to provide specific dates, times, or other details related to your waiver application.

Receiving and Responding to Additional Information Requests (4)


- Select the **Post Comment** button to submit your response.



Once you're satisfied with your comment, select the Post Comment button to submit your response.


Receiving and Responding to Additional Information Requests (5)

- Select the **X** button to exit the Comments window.



Select the X button to exit the Comments window.

Receiving and Responding to Additional Information Requests (6)



Note: You must withdraw your current application and submit a new one to include requested supporting documentation.

You must respond to the reviewer by the provided deadline or your waiver application will be denied automatically.

Note that you won't be able to upload any supporting documentation through the comment feature. If the reviewer requests that you supply supporting documentation, you'll need to withdraw your current application and submit a new one in which you've uploaded the supporting documentation.

Also note that if the reviewer doesn't receive a response from you by the provided deadline, your waiver application will be denied automatically. Once your waiver application has been denied, you won't be able to submit another one and be granted a CMS-approved waiver exception for the measurement year.

Logging Out of the EPCS Prescriber Portal

- Select **Log Out** at the top of the screen to log out of the CMS EPCS Prescriber Portal.

When you've done everything you need to do in the CMS EPCS Prescriber Portal, you'll want to log out. To do this, simply select Log Out at the top of the screen.

And that's the end of our demonstration of the EPCS Prescriber Portal.

- A. The prescriber's first and last name
- B. The facility name where the prescriber works
- C. The prescriber's NPI number
- D. All of the above

The correct answer is C, the prescriber's NPI number. On the Check NPI Compliance Status and Submit Waiver Application screen on the CMS EPCS Prescriber Portal, you can look up a prescriber's 2024 compliance status using their NPI number.

Question 3.3

True or false? If a prescriber gets a blue box that says "NO FURTHER ACTION REQUIRED: NPI ... is not part of the CMS EPCS Program for the measurement year," it means the prescriber is compliant with the program.

- A. True
- B. False

The correct answer is A, true. When you get a blue box that says "NO FURTHER ACTION REQUIRED: NPI ... is not part of the CMS EPCS Program for the measurement year," it means that the prescriber wasn't part of the CMS EPCS Program for the measurement year, so the prescriber is considered compliant and no further action is needed.

Question 3.4

In which circumstances can you save your progress on a waiver application, exit the CMS EPCS Prescriber Portal, and return to the waiver application later?

- A. When filling out a waiver application for a single prescriber
- B. When filling out a waiver application for a group of prescribers
- C. Both

The correct answer is A. When filling out a waiver application for a single prescriber, you can save your progress by selecting the Save & Close button. You can't save your progress when filling out a waiver application for a group of prescribers using the bulk waiver application submission feature. You must submit the group waiver application before logging out of the EPCS Prescriber Portal. If you don't submit the waiver application before logging out, you'll have to start the waiver application over.

Question 3.5

What do you need to do by the deadline provided by the waiver application reviewer?

- A. Submit your waiver application.
- B. Respond to the reviewer's comment with the requested additional information or follow the reviewer's other instructions.
- C. Nothing.

The correct answer is B. You'll need to respond to the waiver application reviewer's comment in the CMS EPCS Prescriber Portal where they requested additional information or gave you other instructions to follow. If the reviewer doesn't receive a response from you by the provided deadline, your waiver application will be denied automatically.
