Ms. Christopher has been actively engaged in pain policy for more than 15 years. She has done research, published in this area, and spoken frequently on chronic pain. She has consulted and collaborated with NIH, CDC, HHS, FDA, NAAG, the DEA and many other national organizations on these issues.

Capt. Virginia Giroux, MSN, developer, is a Commissioned Corps officer in the US Public Health Service and has been employed by the FDA/CDER from April 2003 to present. She has served as a Regulatory Health Project Manager, Regulatory Health Education Specialist, Deputy Division Director and currently as the Associate Director for Accreditation.

Capt. Giroux earned her Master of Science in Nursing and is board certified as a Family Nurse Practitioner. As the Associate Director for Accreditation she manages the FDA CE program and serves as the FDA Nurse Planner for all accredited CE programs provided by FDA.

Dr. Greene, a pediatrician and Fellow of the American Academy of Pediatrics, completed her medical education at the Yale School of Medicine, clinical training at the Johns Hopkins Hospital, Masters in Public Health from the Yale School of Public Health, and Masters in Business Administration from Loyola College in Maryland. Dr. Greene gives presentations and conducts teleconferences on program integrity issues.

Margaret Rincon, PharmD, developer, has been employed by CMS as a Health Insurance Specialist/Contract Officer's Representative since July 2017. From July 2013 to June 2017, she was employed as a heath care administrator for the Federal Bureau of Prisons.
