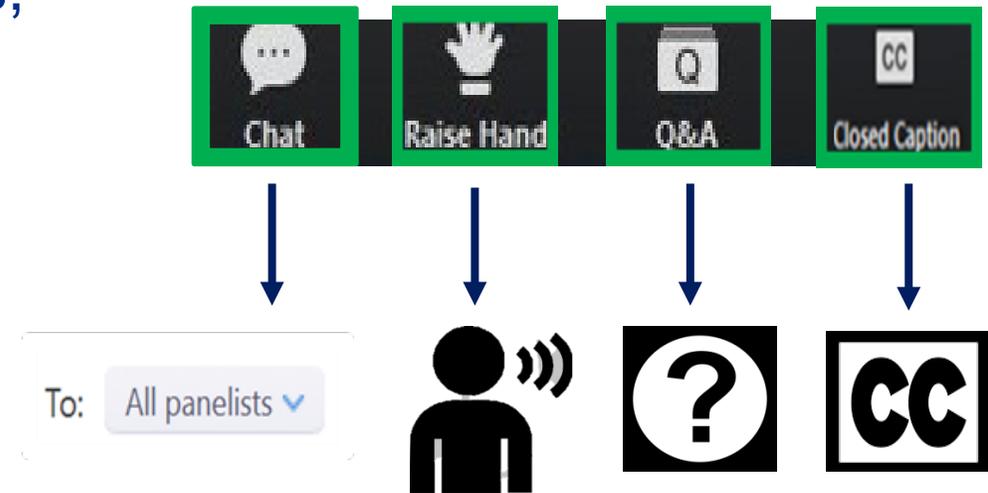

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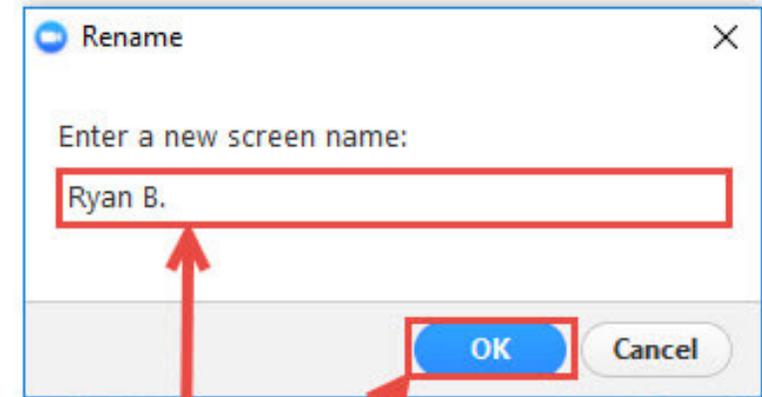

# Tribal LTSS Care: Overview

The evolution of post-acute care has challenged providers to reach beyond their individual care settings to better support relationships across the health care spectrum.

Providing care via telehealth and remote therapeutic/physiologic monitoring can help increase the likelihood of successful care transitions.

This webinar will share which organizational, financing, care, and technology models are being used to support Native elders.

# Community Connection

- **Role of elders:** Valued members of the community, repositories of wisdom, cultural leaders, educators of the younger generations
- **Importance of community involvement:** Promotes socialization, provides emotional support, and reduces feelings of isolation
- **Nursing home's role:** Facilitates community engagement through events, volunteering opportunities, and mentorship programs

# What Is a 105(I) Lease?

- Refers to a provision under Section 105(I) of the Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance Act (ISDEAA)
- Offsets operational expense for facilities used in the delivery of services authorized under the ISDEAA, such as health care services through IHS
- Enables tribes to recover costs for facilities used to operate programs under ISDEAA contracts or compacts, such as health clinics or administrative offices
- Compensation options include fair market rental value, specific cost elements (25 CFR § 900.70), or a combination



# What Is a 105(I) Lease? *(cont.)*

## Eligibility Requirements

- **Facility must be used for approved programs, functions, services or activities**
- **Tribe or tribal organization must hold title, leasehold, or trust interest in the facility**
- **Cost claimed must be reasonable, necessary, and not duplicative**

# How an Organization Can Use a 105(I) Lease



## Offset current facility cost

- Recover expenses for maintenance, utilities, repairs, and depreciation
- Include costs for facility modifications to meet program needs
- Leverage fair market value rental valuations to secure funding
- Be reimbursed for capital expenditures

## Expand resources

- Reallocate budget savings from facility costs to enhance resident care

## Streamline operations

- Consolidate operational costs into a reimbursable agreement under the ISDEAA

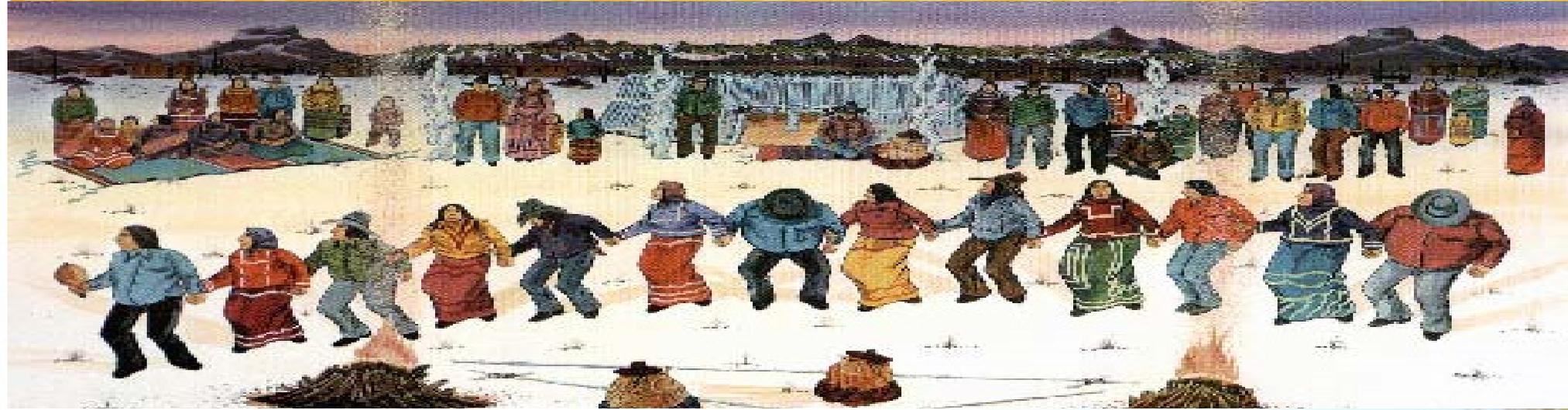

# Tailored Health Care Programs

- **Prevalent health issues:** Discuss specific health problems common in the tribe that the nursing home is equipped to address
- **Specialized care:** Availability of specific programs to manage chronic diseases, mental health issues, rehabilitation services
- **Collaboration potential:** Partnerships with other health institutions for specialized services, research, training
