Dr. Diane E. Meier is Director of the Center to Advance Palliative Care (CAPC), a national organization devoted to increasing the number and quality of palliative care programs in the United States. Under her leadership the number of palliative care programs in U.S. hospitals has more than tripled in the last 10 years. She is also Vice-chair for Public Policy and Professor of Geriatrics and Palliative medicine; and Gaisman Professor of medical Ethics at the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai in New York City. In 2009-2012, she was a Health and Aging Policy Fellow in Washington, DC. Awards include a MacArthur Foundation 'genius award' Fellowship in 2008; HealthLeaders recognition of her pioneering leadership of the effort to bring palliative care into mainstream medicine; and the American Geriatrics Society Edward Henderson State-of-the-Art Lecture Award in 2013.

### Rolfe Sean Morrison, MD-Presenter

Dr. Sean Morrison is Director of the National Palliative Care Research Center, a national organization devoted to increasing the evidence base of palliative care in the United States. He is also the Director of the Hertzberg Palliative Care Institute; Professor of Geriatrics and medicine at the Mount Sinai School of medicine in New York City. During 2009-2010, he served as the President of the American Academy of Hospice and Palliative Medicine.
