The most common titles included Infection Preventionist (402 or 44% of staff enrolled) and Director of Nursing (233 or 25% of staff enrolled). The balance of job titles varied and included, but were not limited to, the following roles. Administrator, Executive Director, Clinical Coordinator, Clinical Nurse Manager, Director of Clinical Services, Licensed Practical Nurse, Registered Nurse (RN), RN Supervisor, Assistant Director of Nursing, Staff Educator, and Nurse Educator. All data regarding the percentage of SNF staff who completed the APIC LTC IP Essentials Online Course, categorized by PA region and bed size, is shown below. Most of the enrollees were from the Southeast region of Pennsylvania. The Northwest (12%) and South Central (10%) regions had the highest rates of completion, based on the total number of staff enrolled, compared to the Northeast and Southwest, which had the lowest rates of completion (5%). North Central (20%) and Northwest (18%) had the highest completion rates for small facilities, while Northwest (12%) and South Central (10%) had the highest completion rates for medium facilities. South Central (15%) and Northeast (11%) had the highest completion rates for large facilities. Four hundred and seventy-three (473) out of the 661 eligible, licensed facilities had at least one staff member enrolled in the *RPP* training course (72%). The Northwest region had the highest percentage of eligible SNFs enrolled in the *RPP* training (77%). The Southeast region had the lowest participation rate (68%). The North Central and Northeast (85%) regions had the highest enrollment for small facilities, while the South Central (83%) region had the highest completion rate for medium facilities. Northwest (95%) had the highest enrollment for large facilities. A total of 83 SNFs (representing 103 staff members) had at least one person who completed the *RPP* training. To complete the course successfully, all educational components and a passing score of 80% or higher are required. The overall average score of the *RPP* training post-course competency assessment was 88%. The average number of *RPP* trainings completed by region is calculated against the total number of enrollments in that region. The North Central region had the highest average number of *RPP* trainings completed (18%), while the Southwest region had the lowest (7%).

Throughout the project, APIC Consulting collaborated with several local organizations to support their efforts in promoting participation. 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Home Administrators (PADONA), Pennsylvania's quality innovation network, Quality Insights (QI), Leading Age PA, Pennsylvania Health Care Association (PHCA), Pennsylvania Department of Health Long Term Care Transformation Office (LTCTO), Department of Health's Quality Assurance, and Pennsylvania Society for Post-Acute and Long-Term Care Medicine (PMDA). 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- APIC Consulting did not fulfill the course completion requirement for staff members enrolled in *RPP* within the contracted period. During year three, the facility completed several educational sessions at Town Hall meetings and developed an educational sheet on the proper use of the system and troubleshooting techniques. Tracking is monitored by individual and group usage. In July of 2024, individual usage was nine, and group usage was 17. In August of 2024, individual usage was nine, and group usage was 26. In September of 2024, individual usage was 10, and group usage was 28. During the third and final quarter of 2024, the total individual usage was 28, and the total group usage was 71. At the conclusion of the project, 18 additional long-term care staff completed certification in the evidence-based *Opening Minds through Art (OMA)* program, bringing the project total to 173 OMA facilitators. During the extension period, 11 additional skilled nursing facilities (SNFs) completed the certification requirements, resulting in a total of 81 nursing homes certified as OMA sites during the 3-year project. Of the 102 SNFs, 51 nursing homes were mature enough in their OMA implementation to submit data, and 33 (65%) submitted at least one of the required data elements. Reporting nursing homes submitted data that demonstrates over 1,796 residents were engaged in OMA sessions, and 37% of artists experienced an increase in mood during their art session. 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A total of 70 skilled nursing facilities (SNFs) were recruited to participate in the *Next Steps in Dementia Care (NSDC)* program, 36 for Cohort 1 (C1) and 34 for Cohort 2 (C2). Of those homes, 57 attended an individual kick-off call, 31 from C1, and 26 from C2. While it is challenging to measure the impact of an online program, the program evaluations completed by 425 out of 433 participants at the end of the online training were overwhelmingly positive. Each cohort was offered technical assistance (TA) calls twice during the program; 22 homes in C1 and 10 homes in C2 participated in at least one TA call. The Behavioral Support Team (BST) training call was offered during each cohort, and a makeup session was provided to homes that were unable to attend the initial call. The survey results over the past three years continued to show that the majority of residents that were surveyed have adjusted to their lives in the home, have found joy in their lives, have the energy to get out of their rooms and participate in activities, are happy the majority of the time, are at peace with themselves and feel rested and relaxed most of the time. The results of the quarterly surveys have also shown that the majority of the residents surveyed didn't feel that physical health or emotional problems interfered with them attending activities, they still had an interest or could find pleasure in doing things, were able to fall asleep most nights, rarely had trouble concentrating, very rarely felt down in the dumps to the point of nothing could cheer them up, or rarely felt fidgety or restless, tired or sad. The iN2L systems were used daily for scheduled group activities and independently by residents. iN2L enhanced resident social, cognitive, spiritual, physical, and emotional programs. Since iN2L updates its programs monthly and continually adds new features, it is able to keep its residents excited about returning for daily programs. In the final reporting quarter, group activity participation increased by 219%, Individual activity participation increased by 106%, and overall participation increased by 159% compared to the first quarter of the project (March-May 2021), the quarter in which iN2L was implemented. Final results: Quality of Life (QOL) surveys have continued to provide an opportunity to understand residents' experience within their day-to-day lives throughout the project. The insight gained from QOL survey results is analyzed and distributed to Project Leaders, and the information obtained is shared with Executive Leadership within the community. Project Leaders have been informed that the Customer Success Manager (CSM) is available for all necessary assistance, including a detailed usage and QOL overview. Regular contact with the community-appointed project leaders is executed to provide guidance and expert advice. Community participants continue to work toward a multi-disciplinary approach to reducing social isolation through group engagement. This, in turn, will increase the quality of life for the residents involved. Through discussions and success stories, the Customer Success Manager (CSM) believes that using iN2L has created a positive environment where residents do not feel socially isolated, resulting in an improved quality of life. To track progress toward these goals, communities conducted quarterly surveys involving 20% of their SNF population. The average QOL surveys completed and reported were collected and charted through the project Customer Success Manager (CSM). 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and two password-protected online resource portals. The program received overwhelmingly positive feedback, particularly regarding its organization, resources, and knowledgeable instructors. By the end of 2024, the project reached individuals working at 164 skilled nursing facilities (SNFs) in Georgia with at least one contact hour of training (this cumulative number includes those who have completed a webinar, Georgia Health Care Association (GHCA) virtual event, the pre-conference intensive at the Georgia Medical Directors Association (GMDA), and those using seats for intensive training, e.g., *Certified Eden Associate Training (CEAT)*, *Dementia Beyond Drugs (DBD)*). As a testament to the quality of the content, many nursing homes (80) have staff who have attended multiple events. More than 1,760 registrants for the twenty-three live webinar /hybrid events delivered, including staff and stakeholders from 69 nursing homes (with 15 being late adopters/one-star rated homes). For *CEAT*, eighty-two (82) staff and stakeholders and staff from 14 nursing homes have completed the 2022 training, 70 staff and stakeholders from 11 nursing homes have completed the 2023 *CEAT* class, and 88 nursing home participants from 12 nursing homes completed the 2024 *CEAT* class, which concluded April 30, 2024. For *DBD*, one hundred twenty-four (124) staff and stakeholders from 24 nursing homes completed the first training session in 2022, 109 staff and stakeholders completed the second *DBD* training in 2023, and 95 staff and stakeholders completed the third *DBD* training, which concluded September 26, 2024. In evaluating the results from the pre-post test for the *Dementia Beyond Drugs* training, the findings show a significant improvement with a moderate effect size on relationship quality, staff empowerment, and quality improvement practices, as measured by the three subscales of the Kansas Culture Change Instrument ( $p < 0.05$ ). This suggests that, on average, improvements have been made to support person-centered care in nursing homes where staff have completed training. Further, there was a significant increase in the staff discussions of appropriate anti-psychotic drug use within the nursing home ( $p < 0.05$ ). Unfortunately, some variables within the communities have sometimes caused limited use of the systems. Staffing challenges, turnover, technical issues, decreased census, COVID-19 outbreaks, and internet connectivity issues have been the common factors in the communities that have contributed to limited usage of the It's Never Too Late (iN2L) systems. Despite the numerous variables, all 23 communities continue to progress in utilizing the technology. All communities are utilizing a variety of content on the technology. According to iN2L, a facility is considered a super-user if it exceeds 100 hours per month of quality usage. During this quarter, 18 out of 23 communities reached or maintained the super-user status on one or more of their systems. Four out of the 23 communities had between 50 and 100 hours of usage, which is considered good usage. During this quarter, one of the 23 communities had less than 50 hours of usage on at least one system. The community with no usage this quarter was Shem Creek. They notified the Customer Service Manager (CSM) that their skilled nursing facility (SNF) closed and no longer has SNF residents. The CSM continues to work with all 23 communities, providing tools/suggestions to build their usage. The usage results indicate an 18.96% increase from the baseline to Quarter 9. The overall average for usage increased from 220.06 at Baseline to 261.78 for Quarter 9. Results were taken from Quarter 2 instead of the baseline since no data was available for usage at baseline, as communities were continuing to get set up and had not yet started using the systems. The usage results indicate a 4.87% decrease from the previous quarter (Quarter 8) to the current quarter (Quarter 9) due to decreased census, holidays, and COVID-19 outbreaks affecting communities.

The Michigan County Medical Care Facilities (MCMCF) implemented a *Comprehensive Best Practices for Person and Relationship-Centered Dementia Care* experiential platform to help hardwire person- and relationship-centered dementia care practices that truly empower individuals living with dementia and those who support them. MCMCF retained commitment from all 34 county-owned nursing homes for this project. MCMCF has partnered with three expert organizations: Eden Alternative, Stress Blueprint, and The Michigan Society for Post-Acute and Long-Term Care Medicine. In each of the three years, a cohort of 10-12 facilities will be recruited for intensive work on relationship-centered dementia care practices. Interim project results are shown below. Year two project results:

- **OBJECTIVE #1:** Engage nursing home teams as active participants in self-directed, online learning focused on the fundamentals of person-centered/person-directed dementia care. This education is provided through eVOLVE Online Learning from The Eden Alternative and features "The Groundwork" and the six-course series *Living Well with Dementia with Al Power, MD*.

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- Activity #3: In terms of Coaching Session participation, all Cohort 2 teams had at least one member attend an online or in-person coaching session, with most homes having multiple team members attending multiple sessions. Overall, the learning sessions were well-attended, and members were engaged. A total of 202 attendees were recorded across eight learning sessions.

The “Core Values Structural Element” in this Practice Guide will provide the framework for eight interactive sessions. Each session will cover:

  - Designated best practice processes
  - Implementation ideas for the best practice processes
  - Drawing connections to the Eden Alternative Domains of Well-being®
  - Homework to complete in advance of the next session
  - Specific best practice processes to put into action before the subsequent session
- Activity #1: Four of five Cohort 1 communities completed pre-assessments in Year 1 and Year 2. Based on the longitudinal nature of the project, it was hypothesized that the average composite RTB pre-scores of Cohort 1 homes would improve from Year 1 to Year 2. Eleven of the twelve participating homes from Cohort 1 and Cohort 2 had team members complete assessments in both the pre- and post-timeframes.
- Based on results, six of the eleven teams (55%) reported progress on the composite score of all RTB practices from the pre- to post-timeframe.

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- It's important to note that lower post-test response rates likely impacted results, as not all participants are represented in the matched analysis. Additionally, several individuals and homes reported lower implementation rates from the pre-assessment to the post-assessment. This often occurs when individuals learn more about person-directed living through education and exposure to more in-depth concepts.

*Blueprint Empowerment Circle (Cohort 2) - Final Summary*

The Stress Blueprint conducted the Blueprint Empowerment Circle (BEC) program to enhance stress management, communication, emotional intelligence, and self-leadership skills among healthcare professionals caring for patients with dementia. The Blueprint Empowerment Circle organized live virtual webinars on stress management, communication, emotional intelligence, and self-leadership from November to September 2024. The webinars were recorded and uploaded to the educational platform, along with a PDF copy of the presentation, for attendees. The live webinars were well-received and attended by facilities point of contact persons, with an average attendance of 15 participants and a maximum of 23 participants. Additionally, 25 attendees accessed the webinar recordings on our educational portal. It was anticipated that 70% of attendees would find the sessions beneficial, gaining one to two valuable insights applicable to their personal and/or professional lives. The post-webinar survey results exceeded our expectations. Remarkably, 93-100% of attendees reported the sessions were beneficial and provided actionable takeaways for their personal and/or professional lives. In an ad hoc survey, 75-100% of attendees expressed their willingness to recommend the training to other healthcare institutions. In summary, the BEC's comprehensive approach to nurturing emotional intelligence, enhancing communication, and promoting self-leadership has not only exceeded expectations but has also garnered unanimous praise from our participants.

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A total of 95 skilled nursing facilities received and administered the training independently, with 93 of these facilities having unique Nursing Home CMS Certification Numbers (CCNs). Two facilities received and administered the training, both in year one and year two of the project. There was a total of 15 facilities, with 14 unique nursing home CCNs, that received structured onsite assistance. There was one facility that received a structured onsite training in both year one and year two of the project. The identified and established key performance measures included a 20% increase from the baseline established in 2019 for the total number of staff trained. The baseline for this metric spans from January 2019 to June 2019, encompassing 1,081 licensed staff and 1,427 certified nursing assistants (CNAs). The goals for these measures were exceeded. The total number of licensed staff trained through the duration of this project was 2,350, and the total number of CNAs trained was 4,573. A total of 6,923 long-term care (LTC) direct care workers in Wisconsin received this specialized wound care education. The project fell short of meeting the total number of facilities that completed the education. Still, it exceeded the goal for the total number of staff who participated in and completed the education. This project has increased competency in pressure injury assessment, identification, and measurement, as well as Diabetic neuropathic foot ulcer care and prevention throughout skilled nursing facilities in Wisconsin. Both licensed staff and CNA staff will be better equipped to prevent wounds from developing and care for the skin of residents in LTC facilities. Based on feedback questionnaires received through mid-August 2024, 100% (of 93) respondents strongly agreed or agreed that their staff "will be able to apply what they have learned to their daily practices;" 98.9% of respondents indicated that the program increased staff competencies as it relates for caring for residents with pressure injuries or diabetic foot ulcers. Upon reviewing trends in qualitative feedback received, nursing homes found value in the program's real-life and simulation-based structure. For example, one nursing home stated, "the hands-on measuring and wound charting, the wound identification for nurses," was valuable. For the CNAs, the hands-on barrier was the onion, and the nutrition was accompanied by goldfish. CNAs were able to put their care and the needs of residents into a deeper perspective.

By providing adequate training to staff and having sufficient staff, Lakeview Christian Home has allocated the resources to spend additional training time with those staff members who require further development. Staff have improved their communication skills, which has helped to recognize changes in behavior that can be addressed early with providers.

The goal of the project was to reduce antipsychotic medication by 10% over the three years. The baseline percentile at the project's start was 21.7%. During the fourth quarter of 2024, New Mexico Health Care Association (NMHCA) conducted four site visits; other visits were planned but were cancelled due to COVID-19 outbreaks. There was also one-on-one outreach to facilities with new administrators, sharing information with them, as well as discussions about revisits should the environment change. NMHCA provided multiple training opportunities at the annual convention. NMHCAA spoke with staff members from various departments at New Mexico Nursing facilities. These staff members were chosen randomly as they went through their normal shift duties. The goal of the interviews was to provide an opportunity for staff to provide honest feedback without fear of judgment or retaliation. Questions were designed to elicit a conversation about their experiences with coworkers and supervisors, as well as their feelings about the level of appreciation they and others received. Specific questions were asked regarding preferred benefits and recognition. Pre-interview questions were sent to the facilities on specific benefits and pay rates for various departments, and information was reviewed. Most facilities visited reported offering a full spectrum of benefits, including health, dental, short-term disability insurance, retirement plans, and education reimbursement. Some of the more common issues in facilities included communication problems, deficiencies in onboarding new staff, and a lack of teamwork across various departments. The direct care staff turnover rates for the facilities visited in the fourth quarter,

In addition, knowledge gaps regarding the persistent nature of the organism, ease of transmission, evaluation of risk factors (including the host and the environment), and prevention measures (such as robust cleaning practices and antibiotic stewardship programs) may contribute to a poor understanding of the severity this organism poses to long-term care (LTC) settings. The COVID-19 pandemic has shown that a lack of knowledge and preparedness can have devastating consequences in nursing homes and skilled nursing populations.
- b) The goals of this project are three-fold. First, to educate facilities on the nature and risk of *C. auris* infection and colonization. The second is to assist facilities in evaluating their risk and recognizing and responding effectively in the event of a *C. auris* outbreak, understanding that a single case represents an outbreak. Third, to assist nursing home facilities in developing a response plan if *C. auris* is identified or suspected in their resident population. Addressing the risk of *C. auris* in nursing homes and assisting facilities to respond quickly and effectively control an outbreak when cases are identified or suspected directly addresses resident safety and quality of life.
- c) Residents will benefit from early identification and treatment.
- d) New Mexico nursing homes and skilled nursing facilities (SNFs) have an opportunity to prepare. At the same time, case counts are low, but it is essential to understand those residents at risk of colonization or infection and identify modifiable opportunities for infection prevention. Early

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identification of *C. auris* is essential to stop transmission to other residents. Especially, as invasive *C. auris* infection is associated with high mortality, ranging from 22% to 57% in the U.S. (Adams et al., 2018), with “more than one in three patients dying within a month” (CDC, 2020) of infection. Measures to identify colonization of residents and environmental contamination are disruptive. An example of disruption to the residents’ care and daily activities includes the New Mexico Department of Health (NMDOH) initiating laboratory screening through swabbing of all residents and staff to identify additional cases. The implementation of transmission-based precautions and other measures deployed to control the spread (CDC, 2020) may have a negative impact on residents’ physical and mental well-being, as observed during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Phase 1 of the project was completed by December 20th, 2024, with onsite assessments and 30-day follow-up evaluations of twenty (20) facilities. Pre-assessment data were collected to assess knowledge and perceived risk of *Candida auris*, and post-assessment data were collected to measure changes. All 20 facilities completed the pre- and post-surveys. The onsite assessment included the use of adenosine triphosphate (ATP) testing to evaluate the effectiveness of environmental cleaning of high-touch surfaces and equipment. All 20 facilities received the results of the ATP testing, along with a written report. All 20 participating facilities received a binder containing resources, including a sample *C. auris* response plan and educational materials. Materials were also available electronically for use in the facility. A 30-day follow-up call was scheduled to evaluate whether the facility had a written *C. auris* response plan in place and to address any additional questions or concerns identified in the written report, as well as to offer infection prevention consultation. Of the 20 facilities, five (25%) had completed a written plan, 15 (75%) did not have a written plan in place (this included those in the process of completing it), and seven (35%) did not participate in the final evaluation.

The *Reading2Connect®* (R2C) program addresses the cognitive, environmental, physical, and psychological barriers to reading through specially adapted books and materials. The R2C project was implemented in thirty skilled nursing facilities. The project allowed residents to achieve a higher level of well-being through independent reading, expressing their individuality, recalling their pasts, sharing humor, and emotionally connecting with peers, family, and staff. The project uses a combination of online training, on-site practicum, guided implementation, virtual coaching, online caregiver support courses, newsletters, and additional resources to aid staff in implementing the program. More than 620 residents participated in the program. Staff observed a positive response from residents 97% of the time, along with an increase in resident participation in activities. As of December 2024, LeadingAge California launched an awareness campaign to encourage skilled nursing facilities to play the ten Obie analytics games. Some facilities keep the Obie projector turned on for a specified number of hours at a time. In contrast, others leave it on continuously for residents to play and interact at their leisure. Of the fifty skilled nursing facilities, forty-eight completed the quarterly participant survey. 48% of residents (1,858 residents) reported liking and using the games. Obie Analytics generates a unique Obie Measurement Index (OMI) score in four areas: resident movement, engagement, memory, and distractions. For the 50 skilled nursing facilities, the OMI increased by two points since quarter 7. Based on two average hours of play across the fifty skilled nursing facilities, the quarter 8 average scores were as follows: 13 for engagement, 10 for memory, 6 for movement, and 10 for distraction.

- a) The *Oregon ECHO (Extension for Community Healthcare Outcomes) Network* implemented a post-COVID-19 series of the virtual program, *Nursing Facility Behavioral Health and Pandemic Impact ECHO Program*. The project will establish a post-pandemic COVID-19 cohort within the Nursing Facility Behavioral Health ECHO (NFBH) program, addressing topics that impact nursing facilities and their residents.
- b) *ECHO* is a 24-session group tele-mentoring format that builds the capacity of participants to manage common conditions typically referred to a specialist outside their setting. The project aims to develop more knowledgeable and skilled nursing facility (SNF) staff who are better equipped to deliver person-centered care that addresses their residents' mental health concerns and behavioral issues in the post-COVID era. The project consists of three 12-session *ECHO* virtual programs that meet bi-weekly and will launch a new series annually through 2025.

**Results of the Project:**

Following the program's first year, previous updates included a written status report on faculty recruitment, curriculum development, participant recruitment, and planning for the kickoff event. The interim success report and status update include attendance, survey/feedback results, and curriculum details. Forty individuals representing 14 unique counties across Oregon participated in the *Nursing Facility Behavioral Health and Pandemic Impact ECHO* series. All 40 participants indicated that this was their first ECHO series, and 37 attended at least one session in the cohort series. While it is common with ECHO participation, attendance and survey responses dropped off after the first few sessions. The primary reason for this decline was reportedly directly associated with care provider staffing shortages, changes in ownership, or COVID-19 outbreaks within the participating nursing facility. Emails were sent one to two times per week to re-engage participants and reduce attendance barriers, as well as address any questions in advance. Post-program surveys were sent to all participants between cohorts. Fifteen of the 37 participants who attended at least one session completed the post-program survey, yielding a response rate of 41%. Overall, participants rated their knowledge and skills in recognizing behavioral health conditions as showing positive changes from pre- to post-tests on all topics included in the series. For example, after having completed the program, participants scored higher on knowledge scores on person-centered care, the impact of sleep on behavioral health, and recognizing the risk of suicide. 100% of the participants who responded to the post-survey indicated that the program helped improve their access to expertise in behavioral health management and allowed them to learn about the experiences of other communities regarding behavioral health and 86% said they were likely to use the new information they learned in *Project ECHO* while caring for their residents. In April 2023, a new Community of Practice will launch to continue supporting previous ECHO participants with case consultations and access to experts in behavioral healthcare. An in-depth final report will include a comprehensive summary of Cohort 1's per-session surveys and retrospective pre- and post-program surveys.

The project's goals and objectives were reported quarterly until May 2024. However, due to a change in circumstances between the project partners, the project is undergoing a modification in its delivery. Up until May 2024, all nine participating *GARDEN* communities had received initial training webinars. All 12 gardens and carts had been delivered and installed (with two carts provided to three of the participating nursing facilities based on their census and their licensed bed capacity), all nine participating communities had received and also continued to receive their in-person therapeutic horticulture lessons, presentation of special project opportunities and ongoing garden maintenance consults approximately twice per month. Previous feedback from the participating facilities indicated more liveliness and energy surrounding the *GARDEN* carts, as residents provided care and nurturing to the non-toxic plants growing in their respective carts. Each formal educational garden class focused on at least three of six wellness goals, including sensory stimulation, cognitive stimulation, motor skills, creative expression, spatial awareness, and socialization. During the most recent reporting, a total of 44 *GARDEN* class reviews were collected from 256 class participants. Results from these reviews indicated that 100% of participants met, or partially met, their wellness goals, with 89.8% indicating that they fully met these goals. Over 96% further indicated that the *GARDEN* classes directly improved or positively impacted their emotional state. Ongoing engagement will continue to be measured following their participation in classes, activities, and seasonal opportunities such as *Earth Day Sunflower Gifts*, *Eggcellent Microgreens!*, *Mother's Day Viola Tea Sandwiches*, and *The Wonderful World of Bees*.

The final results indicate that the project made progress in promoting evidence-based best practices that are culturally responsive and inclusive care for LGBTQ+ (lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer or questioning) residents in skilled nursing facilities (SNFs) in the State of Washington. The work to adapt the training to virtual and hybrid formats ensured continuity despite the disruptions caused by the pandemic. The positive feedback from participants, along with the measurable increases in their knowledge and skills, underscores the value and impact of the program. Training was provided for 42 SNFs, and all training deliverables and benchmarks were met. Participants reported a better understanding of the issues impacting LGBTQ+ older adults and expressed intentions to be more supportive in their daily work. **Results of the Project:**

Final results show that this project sent 11 nursing home staff members from four Pennant Healthcare LLC skilled nursing facilities to the Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) Fest 2024 Conference, held from November 7 to 11, 2024. The goal of the project was to empower nursing assistants to apply best practices in resident care and adhere to professional standards of care. The overall rating by the nursing assistants was five, which met the original goal of four to five points. This was measured using a 5-point Likert Scale, demonstrating the extent to which the training was helpful to the CNA. The feedback was extremely positive, and all agreed that they returned energized and ready to share the information with others.

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
