

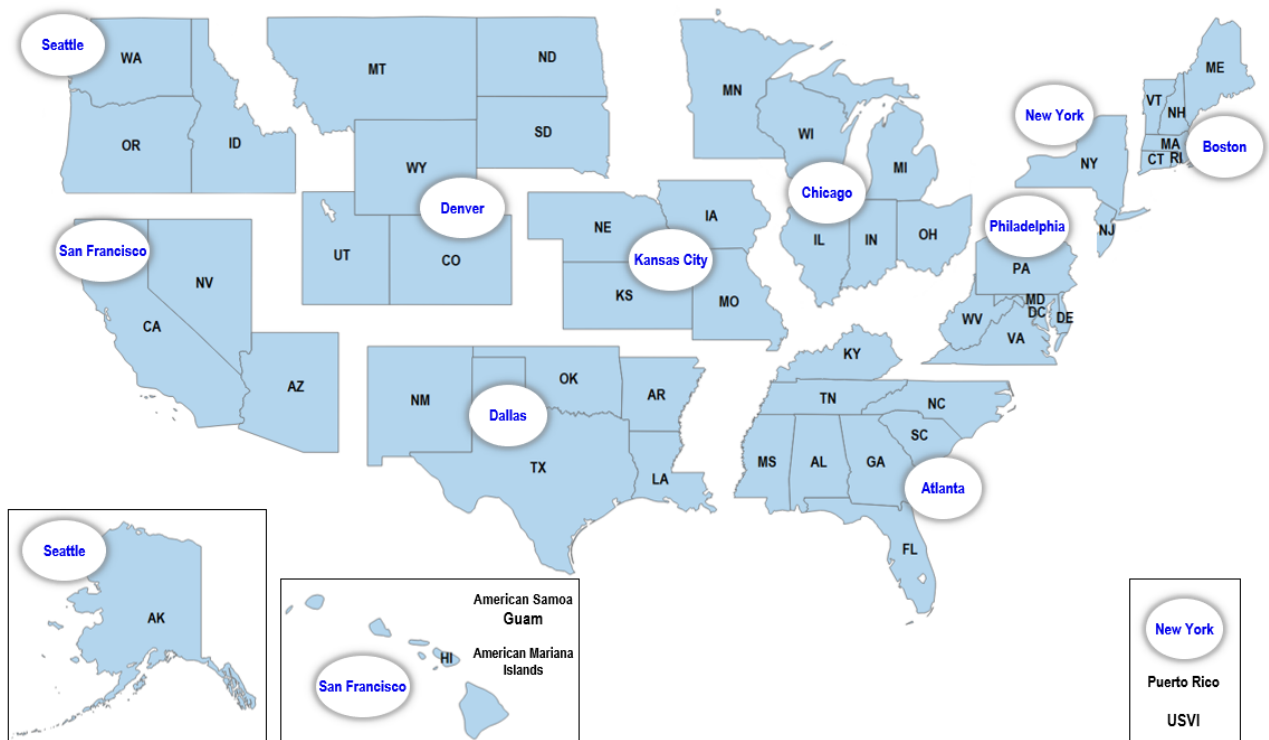

The objectives include:

- Gaining lessons learned from the evacuation and surge of health care facilities in Florida during Hurricane Irma and how to apply lessons learned to their evacuation plan;
- Receiving guidelines on how all Connecticut Long-Term Care facilities will report and be coordinated during local, regional, or statewide disaster events; and
- Preparing for regional disaster exercises with action steps to complete internally at their facility locations.

The aforementioned objectives will prepare the participant for development of a disaster plan and provide the tools that will facilitate efficient management of an incident that may occur in their facility, whether local, regional, or national. Lessons learned from Florida providers who sustained operations during Hurricane Irma will provide valuable information regarding best practices and challenges that a nursing home may experience.

SPOT made available technical assistance and training to support nursing home teams with the greatest opportunity to improve. Its aim is to teach nursing homes to develop and implement Quality Assurance and Performance Improvement (QAPI) plans and conduct root cause analysis, resulting in meaningful corrective actions, improved communication, and engagement of residents and families in QAPI. Each SPOT Initiative Team will provide technical assistance/training to all 60 participating nursing homes through regional learning sessions, virtual learning sessions, on-site visits, telephone outreach, and email support. The focus of the technical assistance/training is to strengthen QAPI in the nursing homes as a systematic, evidence-based approach to lowering adverse events and as an important mechanism for engaging residents and families.

Results of the Project:

In Year 1, most nursing home teams reported that they “haven’t started” to implement communication to all levels of staff, residents, and their families/representatives about QAPI (73%). By the end of Year 3, most reported improved communication; specifically, that they “Just Started” (43%) or were “On Our Way” (26%) to implementing QAPI communication. Participating facilities (N=55 in Year 3 due to closures and voluntary withdrawal) also reported increased likelihood to have written QAPI plans and staff trained in QAPI.

The New Hampshire (NH) Memories Program Civil Money Penalty (CMP) grant provides the ongoing training, equipment, and support necessary for NH's Certified Skilled Nursing Facilities to implement the Music and Memory Program within their homes. Music and Memory provides a non-pharmacological intervention for caregivers to use in attempts to comfort residents during times of pain, anxiety, depression, sundowning, etc. As cited in our CMP fund request, numerous studies have demonstrated that individuals experiencing a variety of adverse symptoms, most notably anxiety, can receive relief from those symptoms during and beyond a session of listening to a playlist of music of their choosing. For nursing home residents, this means an improved quality of life.

a. Purpose of this project is for the facility to purchase the iN2L technology system to make quality of life improvements for the residents of a 181-bed Medicare/Medicaid-certified skilled nursing facility.

b. Acquisition of the iN2L system at Atlantic Shores Rehabilitation Health Center will provide for a myriad of activities based upon resident preferences.

c. Residents will be able to enjoy activities such as virtual cycling through the woods, creating their own music, virtual "visits" to other states/countries, etc. The "My Page" application is particularly useful with personally getting to know or understand the resident as a person and not someone who needs help with "stuff." The "My Page" button allows content to be added from the 4,000 programs and includes a "My Story" section that can be created through interviews with the resident, family members and friends. With a protected password, a family member can access "My Story" and upload photos and videos from home to their loved one's "My Story" page, and the resident can view it at any time. "My Story" can also be printed for the resident to have in their possession. This particular application is an invaluable tool to provide person-centered care.

Results of the Project:

Brenda Zullo, Activities Director at Atlantic Shores, states the following about iN2L "Every day is like Christmas!" With the acquisition of the iN2L systems, we have been able to provide better care for our residents with a myriad of activities based upon their current preferences; from cycling through the woods to creating their own music, to "visiting" other states/countries...the list goes on. The "My Page" application is particularly useful with personally getting to know and understand the resident as a person and not someone who needs help with "stuff." The former WWII pilots enjoy the flying simulation. Over the last year, residents of Atlantic Shores have experienced a great deal of activity programs like never before. Residents enjoy listening to their favorite songs, singing Karaoke on the Bose stereo, creating their own music on the

Music Maker, playing a variety of trivia games to keep their minds sharp, and the most popular activity is playing their favorite game Bingo on the large screen! Some residents independently come into the activities room and ask to use it during their personal time. In an attempt to comment on the effectiveness of iN2L, it seems more appropriate to hear what the residents have to say when asked about what they like about it:

- a. "I love popping the bubbles and coloring." When asked why, replied, "It makes me feel good."
- b. "Bingo, I can see good, because it is so large and helps me play the game with ease."
- c. "My favorites are all of the trivia games, I like finding out about things I didn't know; Karaoke because I like singing and can sing along to the songs."
- d. "Bingo by far. It's easy to see and hear from any place in the room."
- e. "I like watching sermons on the 'big boy.' It makes me feel like I'm in church."
- f. "I can play Bingo by myself, because I can see the numbers now." In the past the resident needed to have someone help him with the numbers.

It has been a very engaging tool for therapists assisting the residents. It has been extremely enjoyable to all who work with the residents. The Family Feud game has also been quite lively and enjoyable as a group activity. According to Giulia Kirsch, the Activities Director at the Delaware Veterans Home, "the iN2L system has been fantastic." We use it daily with all our residents. The programs are run in large and small groups, along with residents using it individually. We have used the program to assist in reducing agitation and other adverse behaviors which we have found to be very successful. We do not have a population here that utilizes the iN2L independently. So, we mostly have staff guiding the programs and interactions.

Therapy uses the system as a distraction tactic while the residents are receiving physical therapy (PT). On the units, the nursing staff uses the live web cams with puppies and kittens, watching old tv programs such as Dragnet, and old movies. My staff utilizes it for all our programming which includes Bingo, sing- a-longs, trivia, and travel logs. While I am not currently tracking resident falls, we believe that the iN2L system in the common areas has kept the residents engaged in programming and lessened the chance of a fall. We have seen increased engagement and a reduction of behaviors in relation to the use of iN2L. Generally, on the units, we have two to three residents using it at any given time near the nurse's station or in the dayroom. The system is fantastic. "We could not be happier with the system and it's positive impact on our department."

Project will hire a qualified individual to coordinate an expansion of the state's Music and Memory program with the goal of improving the overall quality of life for nursing home residents with dementia.

Funded Entity(ies):

Delaware Division of Health Care Quality Office of Long-Term Care Residents Protection

Results of the Project:

A total of 100 residents were given equipment, with 10 residents in each facility to get their program started with this specific grant. We expand to 10 facilities with each grant. Facilities are using personalized tracking sheets or using their Point Click Care/Matrix systems to track usage of the program.

Reduced medications: Several facilities have found that this program has been directly correlated with reducing residents' anti-psychotic medications. While they have not eliminated the medication, reducing the dosage is still a great outcome.

Expansion of the program has been seen throughout corporate offices. Acts Retirement-Life Communities (ACTS) corporate office in particular has seen the success in Delaware nursing homes due to our Civil Money Penalty funded project, and it has decided to expand this project to all of its facilities. Additionally, ACTS has provided enough equipment to the facilities in Delaware so that all of its residents in their skilled nursing facilities have access to their own MP3 players.

Through each grant expansion, we have seen reports of decreased behaviors, such as yelling, hitting, and other disruptive behaviors. This has been a great calming factor for staff to utilize throughout the day. Staff use this program before bathing/changing the resident and performing other activities of daily living. Staff are now being trained at staff orientations on this program in all the nursing homes throughout the state of Delaware. This means that there is more staff involvement with this program. Having all staff trained on this program ensures that residents have access to this program at all hours of the day. Another positive outcome that facilities have witnessed is improvement in nutrition in some residents. There have been reports of several residents developing a better eating pattern while listening to their music during meal time because they are able to focus on the food they are eating rather than on their surroundings. Family members have been able to engage with their loved ones more often by connecting with them through music. There have been many residents who regain some memory while listening to their favorite songs. In some cases, we have seen residents who have not spoken in years pick up the phone to call their daughter, talk about their careers (which they previously had forgotten about), and have the ability to remember their family members' names. These are huge outcomes for family members who have not heard their loved one speak in years.

The project will provide an MDS 3.0 workshop to Delaware Medicare/Medicaid certified nursing homes and surveyor staff. The purpose is to provide certified nursing homes and surveyors training on the most recent updates of the MDS (section by section); detail the guidelines for capturing activities of daily living (ADLs); describe coding, management and care of pressure ulcers per the Resident Assessment Instrument (RAI) User's Manual; and apply RAI instructions to develop Care Area Assessments. The training will discuss the importance of therapy services and documentation.

Results of the Project:

Two separate presentations were offered with one for new Registered Nurse Assessment Coordinators (RNACs) and surveyors, and the other for seasoned RNACs and surveyors. Day one was for the new RNACs and surveyors: 14 facilities sent 22 staff and six surveyors to attend. On Day two for the seasoned RNACs and surveyors, 36 facilities represented by 69 staff and 18 surveyors attended. Each certified nursing facility was provided the most up-to-date knowledge on the new MDs.

development of measures of quality of life in persons with Alzheimer's disease, the care of patients with late-stage dementia, and autism in the elderly.

Results of the Project:

Twenty-three facilities sent 52 staff, and the Division of Health Care Quality sent 24 surveyors. Delaware staff, including nurses, certified nursing assistants, and activity staff who work in Medicare/Medicaid-certified nursing homes, were provided the most up-to-date knowledge on the clinical aspects of dementia care. All participants were provided an understanding of dementia to identify common causes of aggressive, repetitive, and sun-downing behaviors in adults; to describe behavioral/care interventions that may be used to prevent or reduce difficult care situations; to describe challenges related to caregiver stress and utilize stress reduction techniques; and to learn alternative activity interventions that are success-oriented. The Division of Long-Term Care Residents Protection ensured that Delaware staff who work in Medicare/Medicaid-certified nursing homes had the most up-to-date knowledge on the clinical aspects of dementia care. A post-test was administered to participants to gauge their knowledge by an accredited Certified Dementia Care Practitioner.

The purpose of "Brain Injury 2.0: Skilled Nursing Facility Edition" is to provide a specialized training program for the care of individuals with brain injury in Maryland nursing homes. The project will use the Brain Injury Association of Maryland's three-unit curriculum (Brain Injury 101; Traumatic Brain Injury Behavior Management; Brain Injury Nursing Care: Concepts and Strategies) as a basis for the training, with an additional unit on substance abuse and brain injury.

Funded Entity(ies):

The Beacon Institute, Inc.

Results of the Project:

The project increased the ability of nursing homes to provide care to residents with Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI). Direct care staff have greater confidence in their ability to provide support for residents with TBI. Residents and their families are more satisfied with the quality of their care. Eight staff from Communicare buildings were trained in Brain Injury and Nursing Care. From this training, a series of five training videos were created. A marketing campaign has been executed to make nursing homes aware of the free resources available on the funded entity's website.

Study findings show student volunteer participation in OMA is associated with significantly improved attitudes toward older adults living with dementia. Resident feedback was obtained following each OMA art making session using a standardized questionnaire developed specifically for the project. All 610 participating residents rated OMA highly, averaging 2.5 out of 3 on all items on the evaluation. Additionally, volunteer partners who were paired with residents asked residents to indicate their mood by selecting from a series of faces depicting moods ranging from Unhappy (1) to Very Happy (5). Most residents reported feeling just above neutral before participating in OMA and became more than somewhat happy after participating in OMA. Resident comments were also collected, and 92% center around enjoying the program, feeling proud of the artwork they created, being surprised by their creations, and valuing their friendship with their OMA volunteer partners.

Additionally, numerous factors affected implementation of the telehealth technology at one of the facilities, which, despite corrective efforts, resulted in discontinuation of this facility's participation.

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Goals of this project were to reduce emergency room (ER) visits by 10% and reduce hospital admissions and readmissions by 10%. For the facility that remained in the project, ER-only visits declined by 42.5% during the project period, and observation stays declined by 33.3%. However, inpatient admissions increased by 9.7%. Interim results: Sixteen nursing homes (NHs) participated in this project. Participating NHs received four collaborative sessions. The first collaborative session was instructor lead by representatives from The Eden Alternative organization. It was on creating awareness in medication use and overuse. Other sessions were Eden created video recordings of subject matter experts (SME) concentrating on optimizing the use of medications by focusing on residents' well-being and methods to simplify the medication administration process. The third session built upon previous concepts by advising participants to continue making changes and dig deep to consider alternative methods for pain management. The final introduced methods to incorporate medication therapy optimization interventions into daily practice. Action periods occur between collaborative session, during which participating NHs receive coaching and assistance on the project through a combination of on-site and virtual visits. Examples of Benefits to Residents:

- One nursing home reduced the number of residents receiving antidepressants from 6 to 1 and anxiolytics from 4 to 0.

The evaluation component of this project focused on documenting an anticipated positive change in self-reported knowledge, attitude, and skill in providing person-centered care to residents living with dementia. The scoring was on a scale of one to five, with one representing 'Not Confident' and five representing 'Very Confident'. The knowledge component increased from an average of 3.86 to 4.51. Interim Results: At the end of the first year, 45 visits to enrolled homes were conducted to complete trainings and quarterly meetings. Forty-five situation, background, assessment, and recommendation/request (SBAR) tools were collected. 37% of the forms included some type of diagnostic test and 64% of the forms showed residents were given at least one antibiotic. The most common antibiotic used was Bactrim. The results of the SBAR data received were 58%

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of the infections were urinary tract infection (UTI), 33% were lower respiratory infection (LRI), and 9% were related to skin and soft tissue infections. The results of a decrease in the use of inappropriate antibiotic use is pending.

Recommendation: The SBAR tool should be offered in an electronic format to simplify submission to the medical director.

Two webinars were held and available on Apiari's website for 30 days as a reference to nursing homes. One workshop was held in four locations across Oklahoma to discuss the results of the protocol assessment, Centers for

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Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) guidelines and timelines for influenza, Prevnar 13, and Pneumovax 23. Thirty root cause analyses were completed for underperforming homes. Immunization posters were developed to promote the importance of influenza and pneumococcal vaccine to residents and staff. The posters are available at www.apiariconsulting.com. For long-stay pneumococcal immunizations, Oklahoma has improved from 39th in the nation to 24th. Long-stay influenza was above the national average at the project baseline. Improvement in this measure was minimal. Videos of Oklahoma nursing homes immunizations best practices were available on Apiari's website.

Recommendation: Training material were not provided at workshops. Outcomes of nursing home staff vaccinations were not provided.

Results of the Project:

Goal: ELDA graduates, as well as those with whom they work with, will report increased leadership capacity after completing the 50-hour course and remain with their employers for up to 18 months after graduation.

1) Statistically significant increase in confidence in their leadership competencies from before to after the ELDA-their perspective of themselves as leaders changed and they viewed themselves as more competent, confident, and effective leaders (perspective transformation is a goal of the ELDA).

2) Statistically significant difference in the frequency of effective leadership behaviors from before to after the ELDA using the Leadership Practices Inventory (self-reports and reports of up to seven individuals with whom they work).

3) ELDA graduates recognize the tremendous value of teamwork, relationships and communication. They view their staff as an indispensable asset to be involved in decision making and contribute toward improved resident outcomes, regardless of the generational differences they may encounter.

4) Improved quality of resident care and clinical outcomes, team work, communication, relationship building and administrative outcomes (cost savings) based on the Performance Improvement Projects that are required for graduation.

5) Retention rates of ELDA graduates in their LTC setting rivals both state and national averages. (Six-month follow up retention rate for cohort 1 is 92%. Rates will also be determined at 12- and 18-months post-graduation).

Goal: Continue to achieve a 3.0 or higher (on a 4-point scale with 4 being the highest) on the overall evaluation of each day of the ELDA.

Outcomes:

1) The daily class evaluations received almost all “excellent” with a few “good” ratings (3.5 on a 4-point scale) regarding speakers, teaching methods, organization and usefulness of content, learning objectives, overall evaluation of the day, and the relevance and likelihood of incorporating the content into their practice.

Provide technical assistance and support to homes in regional learning sessions and phone consults to help them implement an RSVP in their home. Utilize sleep trainers and consultants on this project utilizing the quality improvement methodology of the Institute for Health Improvement (IHI) Collaborative Model and Quality Assurance Performance Improvement (QAPI) tools to coach homes through the needed changes. Each home will engage a multi-disciplinary team that includes direct care staff to successfully implement and operationalize five operational interventions to reduce sleep disturbances and three interventions to keep residents awake and engaged during the day. Quality sleep is essential for nursing home residents to maintain general health but also to enhance their quality of life. Lack of sleep increases risk for falls, sensitivity to pain as well as depression and memory loss. It can also reduce hastily prescribed and unnecessary prescriptions for sleep or agitation which have side effects and can be habit forming. A good night's sleep was proven to reduce falls. Articles support reduction in agitation and combative behavior. This project has the potential to greatly improve the residents' overall quality of life and to support person-centered care planning practices of the homes.

PSU Institute on Aging (IOA) developed a tool to assess person-directed care (PDC) from the point of view of residents, called the Resident VIEW. This was previously called the "Person-Directed Care Instrument for Residents." When completed, the Resident VIEW can be used as an instrument and tool in multiple ways, such as:

- 1) By staff in any Long-Term Care setting to identify areas in which residents are not receiving support that is important to them and to use that information to address shortcomings through service plan changes, training or program changes;
- 2) To assess progress toward reducing institutionalization and supporting autonomy, choice and dignity;
- 3) By surveyors to determine if residents are getting the type of care that is important to them; and
- 4) By researchers to gather evidence of best practices in person-directed care.

Benefits to nursing home residents:

The resident VIEW tool will help:

- 1) Ensure individual residents are receiving care in ways that are meaningful and important to them;
- 2) Facility staff to develop more person-centered, comprehensive care plans;
- 3) Identify gaps in care and develop training topics for staff to address these gaps;
- 4) Assess progress toward reducing the institutional milieu of many nursing homes by supporting autonomy, choice and dignity;

Project Summary (a. Purpose, b. Goals, c. Benefit to nursing homes, d. Target audience beyond nursing home residents, if applicable):

The Geriatric Mental Health Long-Term Care Program in Oregon utilizes the evidence-based success of the University of New Mexico's Project ECHO. This innovative format uses "hub-and-spoke" networks led by a "hub" of experts using multi-point videoconferencing to conduct virtual clinics with community providers. The University of Rochester has used the ECHO model to effectively telementor 50 nursing facilities in 10 counties in New York state, providing long-term care providers with access to geriatric mental health experts.

Goals: The immediate goal of the ECHO Program is increasing the knowledge, skills and confidence of the nursing facility care teams to quickly detect and effectively treat mental health and behavioral care needs, employing person-centered psychosocial interventions and appropriate psychopharmacology. Improvement is expected in the competency of care provided to current residents with challenging mental health and behavioral care needs with intended outcomes of increased resident placement stability, resident

satisfaction, improved quality of assessments and care plans, and staff statements of growing confidence in providing behavioral care.

Long Term Goals and Benefits: The long term goal of the ECHO Program is the creation of a stable knowledge base in facility care teams evidenced by consistent development of person-centered care plans, reduction in emergency hospital transfers for behavioral crisis, denial of right to return-readmit-involuntary transfer, willingness to admit individuals with mental health and behavioral care needs and staff statements of confidence and satisfaction in providing behavioral care.

Intended long term outcomes include:

- 1) Knowledge and skills to recognize the signs and symptoms of common geriatric mental health issues such as dementia, depression, anxiety, substance abuse, and behavioral issues;
- 2) Knowledge of broad classes of medications used to treat mental health conditions;
- 3) Skills to conduct psychosocial assessments through both structured forms and information gathering;
- 4) Skills to provide psychosocial and behavioral interventions that enhance coping skills of nursing facility residents and their families;
- 5) Strategies to meaningfully engage nursing facility residents;
- 6) Self-care skills for nursing facility staff;
- 7) Job satisfaction and retention of nursing facility staff;
- 8) Collaboration among nursing facility staff; and,
- 9) Increased expertise with person-centered care and individualized decision-making.

The project will provide funds to 42 facilities in Washington state for the implementation of a Music and Memory program. The funds will be used for training, equipment purchase and purchase of Music and Memory certification. Resident outcomes should include decreased behavioral symptoms with increased mood, engagement and interaction with others, and improved cognition/memory. One important aspect of quality of care, decrease in use of psychotropic or anti-anxiety medication and physical restraint, is also an included measure.

Results of the Project:

This project provided funds to 42 nursing facilities in Washington state for the implementation of a Music and Memory program. The funds were used for training of staff, equipment purchase for the facilities as well as the purchase of the Music and Memory certification. Approximately 125 staff members were trained across 42 facilities.

Outcomes reported by the facilities included decreased behavioral symptoms by the residents as well as increased resident mood, engagement, interaction with others, and improved cognition/memory. One of the residents participating in the program originally joined simply for the love she possessed of music. She often stayed in her room throughout the week looking for different things to do but has mentioned that she loves reading and writing. In fact, she is attempting to spend her leisure time writing her own memoir of her life and experiences. After a few times listening to her personalized playlist on her own, as it was filled with music of her past, she said that memories began to flood in. These songs were associated with different experiences she had throughout her life, such as the dancing clubs she used to go to, memories growing up during the wartime, being in high school, and times with her family. She reported that she now listens to 'her' music simultaneously while writing, since it has brought back memories she otherwise would not have remembered without these songs from her past. Aside from helping her finish her memoir, she also mentioned that the music "renews her spirit." For this resident, it seems that music has been directly linked to her dormant memories and hearing it again has awoken these memories. Her personalized playlist has not only brought great enjoyment to her life, but also has been helping her with remembering the good times of her past and helping to reclaim her identity.
