Dr. St. Clair Russell recently earned her Doctor of Philosophy degree in Social and Behavioral Sciences at Virginia Commonwealth University. She earned a Master of Science degree in Education with a concentration in Public Health and a Bachelor's Degree in Community Health at the University of Toledo. She also earned a Graduate Certificate in Web-based Instructional Design from George Washington University and is recognized as a Master Certified Health Education Specialist (MCHES) by the National Commission on Health Education Credentialing.

Shiree Southerland, PhD, currently works as a Health Insurance Specialist in the Center for Clinical Standards and Quality (CCSQ) in the Quality Improvement and Innovation Group (QIIG) at The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS). Her primary responsibility include serving as a Subject Matter Expert (SME) for the Adult Immunization Task within the Quality Innovation Network/Quality Improvement Organization (QIN/QIO) and End Stage Renal Disease (ESRD) Networks Program. In this capacity, Dr. Southerland provides National programmatic technical assistance along with working collaboratively with the National Coordinating Center (NCC). Her collateral duties also involve serving as a SME for a Special Innovation Project with the ESRD Networks that review the impact of peer-to-peer support on reducing hospitalizations.

Dr. Southerland has over 15 years of experience in the field of Public Health and Nursing. Her clinical experience includes working in a local health department as a health educator, a community-based organizations assisting with program planning and evaluation, and with several Universities as an Instructor and Mentor. Dr. Southerland continues to maintain her clinical nursing practice, university teaching, and volunteering with several community-based organizations.

Dr. Southerland earned her Doctor of Philosophy degree in Public Health, Human Ecology, and Nursing at the University of Tennessee, Knoxville.

Thomas A Workman, PhD, is a Principal Researcher focusing on health policy and healthcare quality improvement through patient and family engagement at the American Institutes for Research (AIR). He is an advisor to AIR's Center for Patient and Consumer Engagement and has worked on a variety of projects related to involving stakeholders (including patients and caregivers) in health care research, service, and policy decisions. Dr. Workman has more than

15 years of experience in coordinating, facilitating, and evaluating stakeholder engagement in a variety of settings for health policy and program implementation.

At AIR, he leads multiple projects for the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), the Patient-Centered Outcomes Research Institute (PCORI), and the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality.
